**ALEXANDER HAMILTON Post #448****Veterans Advocate Kills Self After War Tours**

Handsome and friendly, Clay Hunt so epitomized a vibrant Iraq veteran that he was chosen for a public service announcement reminding veterans that they aren't alone.

The 28-year-old former Marine corporal earned a Purple Heart after taking a sniper's bullet in his left wrist. He returned to combat in Afghanistan. Upon his return home, he lobbied for veterans on Capitol Hill, road-biked with wounded veterans and performed humanitarian work in Haiti and Chile.

Then, on March 31, Hunt bolted himself in his Houston apartment and shot himself.

Friends and family say he was wracked with survivor's guilt, depression and other emotional struggles after combat.

Hunt's death has shaken many veterans who served in Iraq and Afghanistan. Those who knew him wonder why someone who seemed to be doing all the right things to deal with combat-related issues is now dead.



"We know we have a problem with vets' suicide, but this was really a slap in the face," said Matthew Pelak, 32, an Iraq veteran who worked with Hunt in Haiti as part of the nonprofit group Team Rubicon.

After news of Hunt's death spread, workers from the Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors met with veterans visiting Washington for the annual lobbying effort by the nonprofit Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans, or IAVA. A year earlier, Hunt had been with other veterans in dark

suits calling on Congress to improve the disability claims process.

He had appeared in the group's ads encouraging veterans to seek support from an online network of fellow veterans.

Snapshots posted on Facebook reflect a mostly grinning Hunt. In one, he has a beard and is surrounded by Haitian kids. A second shows him on the Capitol steps with fellow veterans. There's a shot of him from the back on a bike using his right arm to help push another bicyclist who is helping to guide an amputee in a specially modified bike.

Friends and family say Hunt suffered from depression and post-traumatic stress disorder. But with his boundless energy and countless friends, he came across as an example of how to live life after combat.

"I think everybody saw him as the guy that was battling it, but winning the battle every day," said Jacob Wood, 27, a

## Museum Director Uses U.S. Flag As Distress Signal

Chris Perrault likes to take photos. So when he was out for a walk Monday morning and noticed the American flag at the Vermilion County War Museum flying upside down, he took a picture.

In fact, he took several to get just what he wanted – the U.S. flag, flanked by the state of Illinois and POW flags, standing out, nearly straight to the east, in the brisk morning wind.

"It's supposed to be a sign of distress, but can be a form of protest," said Perrault, of Danville. "While I was waiting to get just the right shot, a number of people stopped and were upset or angry about it. One veteran said (in some very colorful language) that he fought in Vietnam and felt totally disrespected."

Just the opposite, said the man who flew the flag upside down.

Harold "Sparky" Songer, director of the museum at 307 N. Vermilion St., Danville, said he's upset with spending cuts for the men and women

in uniform.

"Things are such a mess in Washington," he told The News-Gazette on Monday, "the whole country is in extreme distress."

Federal law says the flag should never be displayed with the union down, except as a signal of due distress in instances of extreme danger

to life or property.

Songer said the "stopgap budget and talk of how the political parties and the president were cooperating was the last straw. Yeah, they worked until midnight Friday only to come to a short-term fix."

"They talk about who won what in this budget," Songer said. "The American people lost."

His sympathies are squarely with U.S. servicemen and women.

"They're cutting the military budget. I feel sorry for the kids who keep getting sent overseas over and over again and to think it might have come to them not getting paid," he said. "Those in the service are already having trouble keeping their families together, they're gone so much, and the number of suicides is a disgrace, and some have lost their homes and can't find jobs when they do come home. I'd just had enough, so I stopped talking about it and did it."

## Suicide Rate Triples For Female Soldiers At War

The suicide rate for female soldiers triples when they go to war, according to the first round of preliminary data from an Army study.

The findings, released to USA Today this week, show that the suicide rate rises from five per 100,000 to 15 per 100,000 among female soldiers at war. Scientists are not sure why but say they will look into whether women feel isolated in a male-dominated war zone or suffer greater anxieties about leaving



behind children and other loved ones.

Even so, the suicide risk for female soldiers in Iraq or Afghanistan is still lower than for men serving next to them, the \$50 million study says.

Findings also show that marriage somehow helps inoculate male and female soldiers from killing themselves while they are overseas. While these death rates among GI's who are single or divorced double when they go to war, the rate among married soldiers does not increase, according to the study.

Scientists say they hope these and other findings will help

friend who served with Hunt in the Marines and in Haiti with Team Rubicon.

But some knew he was grieving over several close friends in the Marines who were killed in Iraq and Afghanistan.

"He was very despondent about why he was alive and so many people he served with directly were not alive," said John Wordin, 48, the founder of Ride 2 Recovery, a program that uses bicycling to help veterans heal physically and mentally.

In 2007, while in Iraq with the Marine's 2nd Battalion, 7th Regiment, Hunt heard over the radio that his 20-year-old bunkmate had died in a roadside bombing. Hunt later wrote online about sleeping in his bunkmate's bed. "I just wanted to be closer to him, I guess. But I couldn't — he was gone."

A month later, Hunt was pinned by enemy fire in his truck as a fellow Marine, shot in the throat by a sniper, lay nearby. Hunt wrote that seeing his friend placed in a helicopter, where he died, is "a scene that plays on repeat in my head nearly every day, and most nights as well."

Three days later, a sniper's bullet missed Hunt's head by inches and hit his wrist. He didn't immediately leave Iraq. His parents say Hunt asked to fly to a military hospital in Germany a day later so he could accompany a fellow Marine who was shot in both legs.

"I know he's seen some traumatic stuff in his time and I guess he holds that to

himself," said Marine Sgt. Oscar Garza, 26, who served with Hunt in Iraq. "He was a very compassionate Marine, a very passionate person, one of the few people that I know that has a big heart and feels a lot of people's pain and makes it his own."

Hunt's mother, Susan Selke, said after Hunt was wounded, she'd hoped her son would get out of the military. Instead, he went to school to be a scout-sniper and went to Afghanistan. He seemed to do well. He was honorably discharged in 2009, married and enrolled at Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles.

He was frustrated by the Veterans Affairs Department's handling of his disability claim. He also piled up thousands of dollars in credit card debt as he waited for his GI Bill payments. Hunt found an outlet to help improve the system by doing work with IAVA. He helped build bikes for Ride 2 Recovery and participated in long rides.

Using his military training, he went to Haiti several times and Chile once to help with the countries' earthquake relief efforts. He proudly told his parents of splinting an infant's leg, and after meeting a young orphaned boy in Haiti named D'James, tried to persuade his family to adopt him.

"If I had one thing to say to my fellow veterans, it would be this: Continue to serve, even though we have taken off our uniforms," Hunt wrote in an online testimonial for Team Rubicon. "No matter how great or small your service is, it is desired and needed by the world we live in today."

Hunt's friends say he was an idealist and voiced frustration that he couldn't make changes overnight. He also questioned why troops were still dying.

"He really was looking for someone to tell him what it was he went over to do and why those sacrifices were made," Wood said.

Last year, Hunt's life took a downward spiral. His marriage ended, he dropped out of school and he began to have suicidal thoughts, his mother said. She said Hunt sought counseling from the VA and moved in temporarily with Wordin in California.

Things seemed to improve for Hunt in recent months after he returned to his hometown of Houston to be near family.

He got a construction job, leased an apartment, bought a truck and began dating. He called friends to discuss the possibility of re-enlisting. In the days before he died, he hung out with friends, and he had plans the following weekend to do a Ride 2 Recovery bike ride. He even told Garza he couldn't wait to see him at a Fourth of July reunion with other Marines.

Then he was dead.

"Clay was always a fighter," Wordin said. "He was always a guy to stick things out and he basically quit life, and I was mad that he felt he had to do that at that particular time."

Hunt's friends and family count him a casualty of war — just like his buddies who died in the battlefield.

Songer said he ran the flag up its pole in the distress position for the first time Saturday morning.

"You know, they say old soldiers never die, they just fade away. But now the World War II vets are dying at a rate of a thousand a day or more, but at least we were celebrated as heroes when we came home," Songer said. "When the soldiers came home from Korea, it was like, 'Oh, we didn't know you were gone.'

Then the ones that made it home from Vietnam and every war since haven't gotten the same treatment, yet they still served their country and some died for it.

"I'm tired. I go through the museum and see the names of the 360 from Vermilion County lost in the bow of a ship or the jungle or on an island the size of a postage stamp, but all the others lost since deserved the same respect.

"I do not consider flying the

flag upside down a disgraceful thing to do," Songer said. "I would never do anything to disgrace the flag or the museum."

Songer fought in World War II and was a prisoner of war. He re-enlisted and also served during Korea and Vietnam as well as a veterans liaison after his military service.

In *Spence v. Washington* in 1974, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that improper display of the flag is a protected form of expression.

them tease out protective social patterns — such as, for example, that sense in a marriage of mattering to someone else — that can be encouraged or instilled in all soldiers to lower the risk of suicide.

"One of the big things we're interested in now is digging into this marriage thing and saying, 'What is it you get, by being married? And how could we put it in a bottle so we can give it to everybody, whether or not they're married,'" says Ronald Kessler, a psychiatric epidemiologist at Harvard Medical School who is working

on the project.

A key goal of the five-year research effort, led by the National Institute of Mental Health, is to identify categories of soldiers most at risk for suicide. The Army suicide rate has more than doubled since 2004 from 10- to 22-per-100,000 among active-duty soldiers, surpassing the rate for civilians of the same age and gender.

This first slice of data from the study, drawn from Army records on 389 active-duty suicides between 2004 and 2008, is only a small piece of a sweeping research effort that will eventually include tracking between 30,000 and 50,000

soldiers from basic training onward, says Philip Wang, NIMH deputy director. Other findings:

- Suicide rates among men increase from 15- to 21-per-100,000 when they deploy to Iraq or Afghanistan.
- Soldiers of Asian descent have dramatically higher suicide rates than other racial groups.




